This online course, conducted over nine Sunday mornings and supplemented by structured home study, assignments, projects, and group case studies, is a comprehensive and well-accepted academic program that has consistently attracted strong student participation. Since its inception in 2004, the course has been well attended by learners from diverse professional and personal backgrounds, reflecting its relevance, credibility, and growing stature. It is designed for healthcare professionals, members of religious communities, the laity, social workers, psychologists, counselors, caregivers, and all individuals committed to contributing to a more ethical, humane, and compassionate society. Over the years, students have excelled in acquiring a deep and practical understanding of ethics, and many have continued to apply this knowledge in professional and academic pursuits.

Recognised by SIRO (Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation) as a research organisation, the Centre encourages participants to engage in meaningful research projects that foster analytical abilities, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills. Distinction students, in particular, are invited to collaborate in ongoing online research initiatives, further enhancing their academic exposure and professional development. Many participants have produced exemplary work, and several assignments and projects have been published in national and international journals—an achievement that speaks to the academic rigor and quality of mentorship provided throughout the course.

The curriculum is carefully designed to empower students through a structured transfer of knowledge and skills. It enables them to study, discuss, and reflect on the ethical, moral, and human-rights-related issues that arise in healthcare interactions. The course also nurtures an understanding of the concept of human dignity across varied biomedical and ethical contexts. Learning is intentionally participatory and interactive, encouraging robust dialogue, group discussions, and brainstorming sessions, both online and in home study settings. Students engage in writing assignments, individual projects, group presentations, and collaborative case-study analyses, all of which enrich the learning experience and promote multiple perspectives.

Evaluation is conducted using a clear and transparent rubric, ensuring fairness and consistency in assessing written work, participation, analytical capability, and final project submissions. This structured assessment approach guides students in understanding expectations and achieving academic excellence.

The broader objective of the course is to equip participants with the capacity to critically examine and respond to the ethical, cultural, religious, and moral issues inherent in healthcare provision. Beginning with matters related to the “Beginning of Life” and extending to the “End of Life,” students learn to evaluate various options available to individuals and communities during critical healthcare situations. In doing so, they develop an appreciation of the real-world constraints—such as limited resources—that influence the decisions of patients, caregivers, and healthcare providers.

Supported by experienced national and international faculty drawn from diverse fields of specialization, the course provides both expert guidance and opportunities for participants to contribute from their own professional experiences. Structured into nine modules, each containing four topics, the program runs from July 2026 to March 2027 and offers a rigorous, enriching, and transformative learning journey for all who participate.

MODULE 1

Introduction to the fundamentals and foundation pillars of Ethics

19th July, 2026

A. Introduction to Healthcare Ethics

Objective would be to gain sufficient knowledge of basic concepts of Bio-Ethics and ethical as well as moral principles. This is important as in the increasing interaction of the People with the Healthcare Services, and the occurrence of more contact flash points of conflicts and differences in viewpoints about the who, why, when, what and how are becoming apparent.

B. Discussions and deliberations on case studies on the pillars of ethics

Learners will also be able to compare different ethical perspectives, justify their decisions using ethical principles, and reflect on the complexities and trade-offs involved in day to day scenarios

C. Current issues and Conundrums in the Application of the Principles of Bio Medical Ethics

The objective is to stimulate discussions and thinking with a critical and ethical perspective into the current thoughts and viewpoints of prominent scientists and authors in the biomedical field and the practical application of these in our lives. The rapid advances in the field of biomedical and genomic research has led to major changes in the Health Care services and their delivery, creating major conundrums in terms of ethics and morals. This is made even more complex with the current pandemic. Objectives would be to learn the Basic tenets underpinning the Concept of Ethics and the fundamentals of the ethical & moral application of Healthcare Sciences and medical procedures. The fundamental pillars of ethical conduct will be stressed on. This would include discussions and

evaluation of the professional behaviors of medical, pharmaceutical, genetic scientists and others' roles, in the way they render their services towards humanity.

D. Clinical research and the Ethical oversight systems that govern Human Research

This would give a historical perspective from the inhuman studies such as the Tuskegee study(USA) to the Nazi atrocities in name of human research, and also the recent research in children and pregnant women. It would then go on to study the oversight committees and legal procedures laid down internationally and National like the Helsinki Declaration and the ICMR Guideline as well the DCGI register of registration of research, and the strict procedures for Institutional research.

MODULE 2

Ethical Concerns in the Beginning of Life Issues

16th August, 2026

A. Introduction of reproductive health and natural conception prenatal diagnosis , preselection and abortion

Starting from becoming aware of the process of the natural creation of life, with the knowledge of the normal anatomical, physiological and psychological process this module would go on to explore the ethical & moral aspects of creation of life, it would then help gain perspectives on mankind's propensity to interfere and intervene, evaluating the different ways of the assisted conceptions and ethical dilemmas subsumed within.

D. Ethics of beginning of life issues

Describe key ethical principles and frameworks relevant to beginning-of-life issues, including autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, justice, and respect for persons. **Explain** the ethical considerations surrounding conception, assisted reproductive technologies (ART), prenatal screening and diagnosis, embryo status, and fetal interventions. **Analyse** common ethical dilemmas at the beginning of life—such as selective termination, surrogacy, genetic modification, and resource allocation—using structured ethical reasoning. **Evaluate** how cultural, legal, and societal factors influence ethical decision-making in beginning-of-life care. **Apply** ethical principles to case-based scenarios to formulate well-reasoned and defensible positions related to reproductive and prenatal care.

MODULE 3

Family & Marital Issues

20th September, 2026

A. Current Issues in the Concepts of marriage, mixed marriages and partnership of couples

The focus would be on the shift in the role of the Institution of marriage, the cultural rituals and the concept of the roles of the family members. It would help develop a perspective of ethical and moral consequences of cohabitation, live-in partners as well as same sex couples and the practices of pre-marital and extra-marital sex. The moral and cultural impact of these changes prevalent in the current society would be discussed.

Participants will also be able to identify support strategies and interventions that can be applied in professional practice or community settings.

C. Ethical issues in First response - Sexual Harassment and Abuse -The POCSO Act

There are numerous horror accounts of how victims have been treated by the supposedly first contact care providers, especially in the first responders to whom the disclosures are made and recorded. The victims often report feeling reliving of the trauma and further distress when interrogated repeatedly. We will discuss the rules and guidelines provided in the new POCSO Act for the ethical and humane approach to them by the first responders, so as not to traumatize them.

MODULE 4

Ethical issues in Human Organ Donation & Transplantation

18th October, 2026

A. Legal Issues in Live and Cadaveric Organ Donations

The participants would learn about the specific laws and procedures, governing the transplant of vital organs, as well as strict protocols laid down, to be followed in the permission and distribution of both Live and Cadaveric organ donations. They would also discuss the role of the watchdog oversight committees which help maintain an ethical and just distribution of organs for transplant. There are different laws governing different organs due to the specific nature of each organ.

B. Ethical Issues in Live and Cadaveric Organ donations

The ethical issues in the process of live organ as well as cadaveric donations, would be considered in details including the hidden peer, family, cultural and religious influences on the donors, as well as the morality of unrelated live donations for profit and the consequences. There would be an awareness and sensitization of the need to donate organs after death and also of the ethical & equitable distribution of the same to those waiting. The donating of organs after the death of a loved one does raise many moral religious concerns.

which attempt to artificially replicate creation. There also would be discussion on the issues about use of discarded embryos for preparing medicines vaccines and research.

The substance addictions are not only by choice but often a disorder and need intervention and treatment. But then is it ethical to intervene in a choice that a person makes? The participants would learn the ethical and other concerns in the management and rehabilitation of such people.

MODULE 6

Issues in management of the Acutely ill and the ICU patients

20th December, 2026

A. Ethical concerns in ICU/CCU/NICU/PICU Management

The basic core ethical issue in critical care is very complex and puts the patient, the caregiver and the medical team in a quandary. It is one of the quantity and quality of care, as well as the costs incurred by the patient's family. Also important is the event of the end of care, i.e., at death or decision to stop assisted ventilation etc., which creates many ethical problems. The discussion would help reach some awareness of the issues and help analyze the philosophical foundation under the bioethical methodology for an appropriate decision making and the need to initiate such discussions between the stakeholders from the time of admission itself.

B. Issues relating to continuity of care, Therapeutic Obstinacy and Rationalized Intensive care

The conflict of the healthcare provider in certain cases is that between his sense of duty as a Professional doctor and the sense of values as a human being. This in itself adds on to the conflict with the caregivers & patient's preferences, to avail of certain treatments or not. The current COVID 19 Pandemic has given us all a ringside view of these dilemmas that healthcare workers face. This is the issue to be evaluated here in the context of the needs of the patients and their caregivers.

C. Issues with reference to prescribing of medicines, procedures and investigations

This session is intended to cover the intricate balance between the prescriptions, their legibility and the investigations, whether warranted or not and the patients perceptions about the same. This should help clear the air of doubts that arise due to insistence of preferred labs and brands of medicines and specific expensive investigations. Also due to the enormous advances in technology, doctors often prescribe expensive and invasive procedures. We will assess the patient's autonomy to consent and to accept consequences of the same.

D. Issues related to sexual behaviors & Sexually transmitted diseases and HIV AIDS

The ethical dilemmas in dealing with the prevention, identification, and also the disclosure and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases including pre & post test counselling would be shared and discussed as would be the ethical issues of confidentiality in life threatening contagious diseases. The main focus would be on the disclosure of major life changing diseases like HIV to sexual partners.

Ethical issues arising in Surgical and Cancer care

A. Ethical concerns in surgical procedures esp. about consent

We would be discussing the ethicality of decision making process and the responsibility of the outcomes.

The ethicality of the decisions and choices, leading to decision making behaviors will be evaluated and assessed from an ethical & moral viewpoint.

Learners will also be able to **apply relevant ethical principles and frameworks** to case scenarios in surgical and cancer care in order to justify ethically sound clinical decisions.

MODULE 8

Building the Doctor Patient Relationship and trust in other interactions

A. Developing a trust between the healthcare provider and the patients & caregivers

From the pedestal to the court of law has been quite a transition for the medical profession. The inclusion of the Medical Profession in the consumer Act created the first schism followed soon after by ill-informed media and some highly publicized negligence cases. The infusion of money and political power interference as well as the Privatizations of Medical Education, led to a major paradigm shift in the Doctor patient relationship. We will explore and discuss these and seek ways to restore this very essential element of TRUST in this relationship.

C. Equitable distribution of Healthcare resources - life saving equipment and drugs

80% of the world's population has access to only 20 % of the total funds allotted to the field of healthcare in the world. India ranks low at only 2% of its GDP. As is clear, this session will discuss the issues regarding the ethical use of these valuable resources from doctors, nurses & trained personnel, to drugs, equipment and vaccines. We would look at the vast disparity of availability, accessibility and affordability and seek ethical views on same.

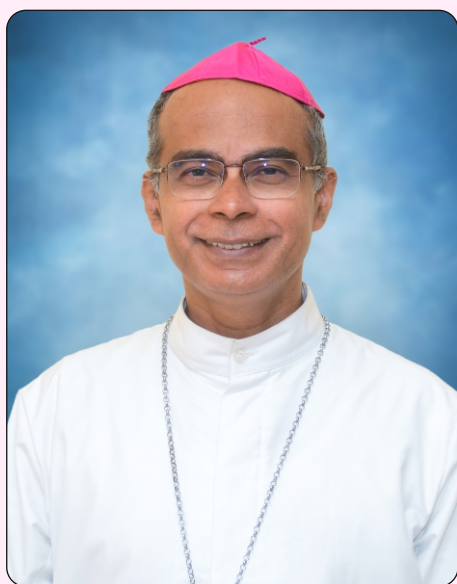
D. Care for the elderly and the homebound. The caregiver's burden

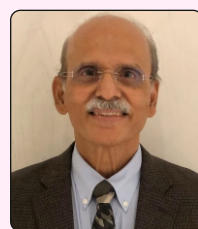
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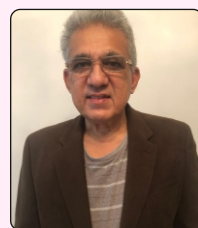

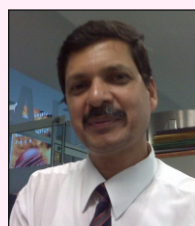
